

The latest in EU policy news from the European Boating Industry

The chances are, whether you work in the boating industry or just participate in water-based activities, you have been affected by European Union legislation.

From design and construction standards for boats, engines, lifejackets and diving equipment, to the designation of marine protected areas, EU legislation is behind many aspects of the boating sector.

In fact, over 80% of legislation affecting the industry has its origins in Brussels.

Giving a voice to our industry in discussions at the EU level is therefore crucial. This is the role played with success by European Boating Industry, the Brussels-based industry association for the leisure marine sector.

We currently work on behalf of 19 national marine industry associations from 17 European countries. Our work encompasses technical, safety and business issues, sustainability and the environment, navigation, professional qualifications, tourism and trade. In 2012 we will deal with a number of issues, such as the revision of the directive on recreational craft, which will introduce new exhaust emission limits for engines, mandatory holding tanks or onboard water treatment systems for sewage, and new obligations for manufacturers, importers and distributors as economic operators.

Work will also be carried out on market surveillance, the introduction of a carbon tax on fuels, boat's end-oflife and new rules for lifejackets under a revised EU directive.

Over the coming months, we will use this column to keep you up to date with these key issues at the EU level.

# No direction on the directive yet...

#### Flag invests and refurbishes

David Lewin tells us that as well as investing in new paint making equipment and fully refurbishing the factory last year, Flag Paints has just launched it's all new livery for 2012.

He says the range features the same value for money items as before but in a colour themed spread of products - easy for the customer to recognise and identify on the shelf. There is also a new brochure packed with useful facts on application and useage to go with it.

## Seajet's antifoul for props and stern gear
